Schools in Category 3 on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and the Category 4 list.

School Preparations for the Bushfire Season

Each year, to prepare for bushfires and grassfires, schools and early childhood services complete a range of activities.

The Department of Education runs an annual fire risk assessment of schools and early childhood services. They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 4) and are published on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR). Diamond Creek East Primary School has been identified as a Category 3 school on the Bushfire-At-Risk Register (BARR).



All schools and early childhood services listed on the BARR and Category 4 list will also close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district.

When the Bureau of Meteorology provides public fire danger rating forecasts or fire weather warnings, they use fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries. Our school is in the Central fire weather district.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan, we have removed vegetation identified as high fire risk. On regular intervals storm water gutters are cleared of debris and we regularly maintain the grasses around the school.

What does this mean for our school?

Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 3 school.

Our school will close on a day forecasted as Catastrophic fire danger rating in the Central fire weather district.

What is the Department's Policy?

The Department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 list to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled.

When will our school be closed due to Catastrophic Fire Danger?

Our school will **close** on a day forecasted as **Catastrophic fire danger rating in the Central fire weather district.**Closure of the school due to a forecast Catastrophic day will be confirmed on the day prior and we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day. Any information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire danger days will be communicated to you by Compass.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, even if the weather forecast changes. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- Out-of-school-hours care will also be cancelled on these days.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas that have Catastrophic fire danger.
- Families are encouraged to action their Bushfire Survival Plan on Catastrophic fire danger rating days. On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.



Schools in Category 3 on the Bushfire At-Risk Register and the Category 4 list.

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Catastrophic days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day.

What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.
- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, checking our website at: <u>Home | Diamond Creek EastPS</u>
 (<u>dceps.vic.edu.au</u>) by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our Emergency Management Plan.
- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is: relocated, undertaking learning from home and/or closed due to elevated fire danger or closed due to a Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the CFA's website.
- Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community may be spread out across
 many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others. Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if
 you are actioning your bushfire survival plan and if your children will be absent on these days.

Enrolling in Foundation (Prep)

Information for parents and carers on when and how to enrol their child in 2025 Foundation (Prep) at a Victorian government primary school.

Steps to enrol your child in Foundation (Prep) for the 2025 school year

To start primary school in 2025, your child will need to turn 5 years old by 30 April 2025. Schooling is compulsory for children who have turned 6 years old.

If your child is starting Foundation (Prep) in 2025, you will be able to apply to enrol your child in a Victorian government primary school from the start of Term 2, 2024 (Monday 15 April 2024).

What you need to do:

- Use <u>Find my School</u> to locate your designated neighbourhood school (referred to as your local school) and other nearby government schools.
- Contact a government primary school to book a school tour or to learn more about the school and the enrolment application process.
- Download the 'Foundation (Prep) Enrolment Information Pack for Parents and Carers.' The pack will be available from Monday 15 April 2024 and will include an application form. The school may also provide you with a copy of the form to complete.
- Submit an enrolment application for Foundation (Prep) by Friday 26 July 2024.
- You will be notified of the outcome of your application between Monday 29 July and Friday 9 August 2024. If you receive an enrolment offer, you should accept the offer by Friday 23 August 2024.
- Take part in enrolment information and transition sessions during Term 4, 2024.
- Your child will start Foundation (Prep) from Wednesday 29 January 2025

Enrolment applications submitted after 26 July 2024 will be processed by the school as they are received, in accordance with the Department of Education's Placement Policy.

Your child has a right to enrol at their local school. Your child's local school is determined on the basis of their permanent residential address. Visit Find my School to locate your child's local school. The enrolling in a school page can also help you to confirm your child's address for enrolment.

If you are seeking to apply to enrol your child in a school that is not their local school, you should read about <u>school zones</u> and how they work and how applications are prioritised using the Department of Education's Placement Policy found on the <u>enrolling in a school</u> page.

Keeping focus on the 2024 school year

As the children settle into the new school year, did you remember to tick off 'see the optometrist' on your 'back to school' list? Many young people experience undetected vision problems as they often assume that how they see is normal.

It is estimated that 80% of learning is experienced through vision and so children with undetected vision problems can have trouble keeping up and as a consequence might become impatient, lose focus and start misbehaving or not enjoying school.

The most frequent vision problems experienced by children are those affecting the ability to see clearly and sharply. These include **short-sightedness** (blurred distance vision), **long-sightedness** (difficulty focusing up close) and **astigmatism** (the distortion of vision due to the irregular shape of the eye). These conditions can be very easy to correct, with a simple measure: glasses. Other vision problems need to be detected and addressed early to reduce risk of long-term vision concerns such as a **turned eye** (**strabismus**), or a so-called **lazy eye** (**amblyopia**). These conditions require management by an eye health professional, such as an optometrist. Untreated amblyopia can even lead to permanently reduced vision in the affected eye.

Incorporating regular eye examinations with an optometrist into your child's health routine can give peace of mind and the best start to the school year – you don't need a referral from a doctor and most consultations attract a Medicare rebate. 

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) Payment Arrangements for 2024 IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the work of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational fund activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the cost of school trips, camps and sporting activities. This initiative is part of making Victoria the Education State and is the State Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

Applications for the CSEF program will open from the commencement of term one, 2024, helping to ensure that all eligible students are able to participate in school trips and sporting activities.

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card are eligible to apply. A special consideration category also exists.

CSEF Application forms will be sent home with the eldest child in the family today - Wednesday 31 January, 2024 or you can collect your form from the General Office if you did not complete a form on or during the 2023 school year.

A payment of \$150.00 for eligible primary school students and \$250.00 for eligible secondary school students will be paid directly to the school to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of the student.

Important Dates:

Monday 29 January, 2024 – CSEF eligibility date. The CSEF web system will perform an automatic check on this date whether a parent's concession card is valid.

Thursday 29 February 2024 - CSEF payments to schools will commence from this date onwards. Regular payment runs will occur throughout terms one and two.

SPORTS REPORT

At Diamond Creek East Primary School we try to offer students a wide range of experiences in diverse sports such as golf, hockey, tennis, badminton as well as the more mainstream sports such as basketball, netball, soccer, footy, athletics and swimming.

The aim is to be fair and give all students equal opportunity to represent Diamond Creek East Primary School. We also endeavour to provide talented students the opportunity to extend their skills and compete at higher levels.

Code of Conduct - The following is annotated from the School Sport Victoria (SSV) 'Code of Conduct'.

The code of conduct is very different from what is acceptable in children's sport outside of school. Please be aware that there is to be no coaching by teachers or parents during affiliated events. This policy becomes more important as students/teams progress towards the State Finals. Sometimes however, at the lower levels, coaches agree that the main emphasis of the game should be on educating the students about the game (rules, positioning etc.) If you come along to watch your child compete, please be aware that telling the 🛬 students where to position themselves, who to pass to, when to run etc., is deemed 🖈 inappropriate. Abusing umpires and opposition players is totally unacceptable. Of course 🖈 applauding good play is quite OK. Everyone who attends our games and events needs to be 🦆 \star aware of the difficult position the teachers could potentially be placed in if parents/ \star st spectators break the 'code'. Students (and teams) who have deemed to have been coached stduring events (such as swimming and cross country) can be disqualified.

Please refer to the SSV web site if you would like to read the Code of Conduct in full.

State Team Trials - The following has been extracted from the SSV website: "Each year, talented Victorian school students have the opportunity to trial for a place in the 🖈 School Sport Victoria (SSV) Team Vic State Team and participate in annual School Sport Australia (SSA) Championships. The sports for primary school students include Australian Football, Basketball, Cricket, Cross Country, Diving, Football (Soccer), Golf, Hockey, Netball, Orienteering, Rugby League, Softball, Surfing, Track and Field, Swimming and **Tennis**. The SSV Championships offer gifted and talented students the opportunity to participate in higher levels of sporting competition against students from other Australian States and Territories."

Students who are nominated for this obviously need to be of a very high standard in their particular sport. They would be the type of player who is dominant at their age level and is regularly winning 'Best and Fairest'/'Most Valuable Player' awards. The purpose of trials is **not** to provide an opportunity for students to gain experience or to have a go, it is about 🔯 identifying elite talent.

In the past, District trials have been held for 'the big four' sports (basketball, netball, football and soccer) but this is no longer the case. SSV implemented an on-line registration process for all sports across the State in 2019.

Parents must register on-line from late December 2023 and registrations will close in mid March 2024 (check web-site for exact dates).

State Team Trials (Continued) -

Please be aware of the following:

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- On the SSV website it has been made clear that students/parents need to consult with their Sport Teacher at school to ensure they have the skill level to trial and represent their school.
- 2. It is imperative that teachers decide on your child's capability of representing their school at a state level trial.
- This discussion with the school Sport Teacher is necessary as all students must get the Sport Teacher/Co-ordinator and Principal signatures on their registration form prior to attending a trial.
- 4. A non-refundable fee is payable upon registration.

Selection Process for Interschool Teams - Grade 6 students nominate their first choice - most students get into the team of choice. However, if there are too many in a particular sport (such as basketball which can only take 9 players), students will be offered their second choice. Should no one take up this offer then the coach of that team will conduct a trial.



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We make every effort to ensure that the students make the choice and are not pressured in any way. We try to avoid going to the trial process as this can only lead to disappointment. Normally, there are very few places left once the Grade 6 students are given priority.



Over the last few years we have run a 'B' team in division two of the DVPSSA competition, so there may be extra opportunities for Grade 5s to participate. We are still awaiting advice if a 'B' team will be running for 2024. Once we have further information will let you know.

The exact 'B" teams that we field will be negotiated with Sacred Heart Primary School on a yearly basis.

The process for selection for either scenario (making up the numbers in 'A' teams or for the 'B' teams) is the same:

Grade 5 students are offered a preference for which sport that they would like to be considered for should there be places available. If there are places available, the students who nominated that sport will be automatically selected (or placed in a ballot if there are more than what is required). If no one has nominated that sport, it will be offered to anyone who would like to have a go. If a Grade 5 student is chosen for a summer sports team, they will not be able to participate in a winter team unless there is no one else available. (Students who agree to play a sport which was not their first choice will be exempt from this rule.) The aim is to be fair and give all Grade 5s an equal opportunity to represent Diamond Creek East Primary School.

Students not involved will participate in the 'alternative sports' program (which in 2024 may include Lawn Bowls, Hockey, Tennis and Calisthenics - this list is yet to be finalised).

Events where district carnivals/tournaments are held, expressions of interest are sought from the students and selection trials are held where necessary. In team events, again, we generally give preference to Grade 6 students.



SPORTS REPORT - Continued

Team Selection for District Athletics/Cross Country - The school runs a house competition for both Cross Country and Athletics and the teams are selected based on results*. In athletics a student can only compete in two individual events and one team event (relay). Students who have 'qualified' for more than two events are asked to make a preference and the other position/s are offered to the next place getter in that event.

(ROSS In Cross Country the top nine place getters in the house event automatically qualify for the district Cross Country. The tenth place in the field is at the discretion of the teacher-in-charge (see below).

In cases where students are unable to compete for reasons beyond their control (i.e. medically diagnosed injury, family holiday) we may run a trial at school to decide who represents the school in a particular event. This will be done only at the discretion of the teacher-in-charge and only if it has been possible to communicate the situation with the other competitions well in advance (not on the day of competition).

For instance - if a child who has competed in the Regional final in 800m in the previous year is unable to compete because of a broken arm - we would inform the rest of the competitors that winning the event is not a guaranteed position in the team - a trial will be held at school.

*There have been occasions in the past where inclement weather has caused the multiple cancellations of events and there has been no other option but to choose the teams based on trials conducted at school and on the data collected from the fitness tests that are conducted each year.

Team Selection for Swimming - Swimming will be held this year. The Swimming Carnival will be held on Tuesday 6 February, 2024 at the Diamond Creek Outdoor Pool for Grades 3-6. Information has been posted on the COMPASS Portal for parents of the Challenge and Enrichment Areas. From this event a 'squad' will be selected (possibly place getters from each event). The final team will be selected from this squad, generally the fastest swimmer will be selected.

A student can only compete in two individual events and two team events (age group relay and open age medley relay). Students who have 'qualified' for more than two events are asked to make a preference and the other position/s are offered to the next place getter in that event.

Team Selection for 'Ancillary' Sports - Hockey 7s, Golf, Girls' Football, Challenge 3/4 Netball, Challenge 3/4 Kanga Cricket and Hoop Time. (Please note that we may not run all of these activities in any given year).

At various stages of the year the DVPSSA/SSV conducts tournaments in various sports. The team selection process is determined firstly - by the number of teams that we are allowed to enter. Generally we seek expressions of interest from the students - bearing in mind that preference to grade is given to Grade 6 students in Certain annual events (e.g. Golf, Hockey, Girls' Football etc.). Should there be more students than required the teacher-in-charge will conduct a trial to decide the final make-up of the team.

Team Selection for Tennis - Expressions of interest are sought from the students - bearing in mind that preference is given to Grade 6 students. Places are strictly limited (usually 2 boys and 2 girls). Students provide details of the level of competition in which they play. Students are placed in the team based on the 'section' level. Where this is inconclusive or the students do not play competitive tennis - a trial will be held at the discretion of the teacher-in-charge.

Please be aware that the SSV will only make allowances for students who miss events as a result of involvement in another sanctioned event. No allowances are made for illness, injury or absence due to holidays.



School Attendance - Every Day Counts IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS

The Victorian Government is introducing new measures to ensure students attend school every day and get the most out of their schooling.

- ★ Children and young people who attend school regularly and complete Year 12 or equivalent have better health and employment outcomes and higher incomes throughout their lives.
- ★ From 1 January 2014, amendments to the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006* will come into effect in relation to the enforcement of compulsory school enrolment and attendance. New procedures to implement the legislation took effect on 1 March 2014.
- ★ This new legislation means that parents could receive an Infringement Notice if their child misses five full days of school in a year without a reasonable excuse





requently asked questions

What is my responsibility as a parent/caregiver?

Make sure your child:

- attends school on ALL school days
- > is on time every day

Make sure you:

- provide the school with an explanation if your child is away
- contact the school if your child does not want to go to school
- arrange doctor and dentist appointments out of school hours
- arrange personal shopping trips with your son/daughter or birthday celebrations out of school hours
- do not allow your child to stay at home for minor reasons.

Is regular attendance at school Important?

- Yes from the first day. If your child misses the basic skills in primary school they can experience difficulties with their learning
- Regular attendance is essential to make sure learning is not disrupted. Regular learning provides building blocks for the future
- Schools help children to develop important social skills, such as friendship building, teamwork, communication skills and a healthy self-esteem.

What can I expect from the school?

- Monitoring of student attendance and review progress on a weekly basis
- Strategies to help you as a parent encourage your child to go to school.

What help can I get If my child refuses to go to school or is truanting?

The school can offer a range of support options:

- teacher working with the student in a supportive, counselling role
- school student welfare co-ordinator working with the student
- provide a mentor for your child
- home visits to identify the problem and help work it through with parents
- identify reasons why your child doesn't want to go to school
- strategies to help you encourage your child to go to school
- develop an incentive program to encourage your child to attend school
- link with community agencies.

Must I send my child to school every day?

Yes, unless:

- your child is too sick or injured to go to school
- your child has an infectious disease
- the principal is provided with any other genuine and acceptable reason for absence







School Attendance - Every Day Counts IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS

Will my child be marked absent if they are doing a TAFE, VET or community program?

No – as long as it is part of the school program.

What if my child is involved in sport?

No – as long as it is part of the school program.

Do I need to let the school know if my child has been away?

Yes – for the wellbeing of your child, Department of Education & Training has an attendance policy and teachers and schools are required to follow up student absences.



Student absence fits into the following categories:

- 1 Illness/injury
- Truancy
 Your child is absent from school without your knowledge
- School Refusal
 Your child does not want to attend school, even though you have tried
- 4 School Withdrawal
 Your child does not attend school
 with your permission. For example,
 family holidays, baby-sitting, helping
 parents at home, working in the
 family business.

Parents and caregivers are powerful figures in influencing the behaviour of young people.

You play an important role in supporting your child to be safe and make informed choices.

That's when every minute counts the most!

Meet the most important person in your child's schooling - you

The research is clear: it's not just about class sizes, the state of the school buildings or whether you're born on the right side of the tracks. The biggest factor in whether students succeed in school is the attitude of their parents. So when parents are told they hold the key, what does that mean? What role do they need to play and what steps can they take to give their child the best chance of shining? **Elisabeth Tarica** asked the experts.



READ TO YOUR CHILDREN

Words are like brain food for babies, says Parenting Research Centre Chief Executive Warren Cann, and it's never too early to start reading to them.

"One of the most practical things a parent can do is introduce their children to reading, as there is quite a lot of evidence that early exposure to books and written material is important for development of reading skills," he says.

Reading to your child should continue well into primary school, says Melbourne University early Childhood expert Kay Margetts.

"It should become part of everyday regular routine and shouldn't be limited to just books — it could be catalogues, recipes and so on," she says. Setting aside a relaxed, quiet time to read stories together, to talk about what's on the pages, and to look for words and letters is invaluable.

Choosing stories beyond the children's reading level allows them to focus on the magic of the story rather than having to struggle to understand every word.

BUILD SELF-CONFIDENCE AND ENCOURAGE

Confidence, says Andrew Fuller, family psychologist and author of the book *Help Your Child Succeed at School*, is one of the most powerful, and one of the most elusive, qualities behind success in life. Confident children with well-developed organisational skills, resilience, independence and social skills will thrive in the classroom.

Mr Fuller, who specialises in the wellbeing of young people, says families that work well seem to praise one another a lot — compliments are made and positive efforts are commented on. Parents should also try to treat mistakes as opportunities to learn and look for the best in themselves and their children by focusing on success, skills and abilities. Encouragement is a powerful confidence-building tool.

"When children make comments like 'I'm no good at maths', acknowledge their feelings and help them to express them. Ask them what makes them feel that way. Accept their fears or insecurities as genuine but don't agree with their self-assessment. You might say, 'I get it that you are struggling at maths, how can we work on it to make it easier?' "

Building social and emotional skills in young children is also vital, says Associate Professor Margetts, whose research has shown that preschool children without such skills find it difficult to cope with the general demands of school.
