ABSENCES

From 1 March, 2014 there were important changes to "Student Absences". As Principal, I have certain legal responsibilities which I must adhere to under the Education and Training Reform Act 2006.

Parents are required to provide reasons for absences. Any long term absences e.g. Parents wishing to take students on holidays will need to be approved by myself and a "Learning Plan" will need to be attached by the classroom teacher.

Please take the time to read the information which can be found on page 3 of this Newsletter and do not hesitate to contact either myself or the General Office if you have any further questions.

DCE CAR PARK

I understand and appreciate that the DCE Car Park can get extremely busy at drop off and pick up times. However, the children's safety is absolutely paramount and it is extremely important to note the following:

Parents who are in a **hurry** should not use the car park. If you choose to use the parents' car park:-

- 1. Drive slowly-less than 5km
- 2. Park economically

3. Be wary of all children, not just your own

4. Do not stop in the middle of the car park thus restricting access to other vehicles

5. Reverse park in parking bays

DO NOT PARK in the zone designated for deliveries or bus parking bay. Do not call your children over to the car – collect them from the path or grounds.

DCE CAR PARK (Continued) Disabled

Parking - These car spaces have been marked to assist eligible people park nearer their destination. If you choose to use these car spaces you must ensure that your "Disability Parking Permit" is displayed at all times.

When using the car parking areas outside the school grounds, do not park in the <u>NO STANDING</u> areas as vision to the crossing and car park entry is obscured.

<u>REMEMBER</u>: That you must **stop** at the exit to Diamond Creek East Primary School when you are facing the red arrow at the exit. Cars should not enter the Pedestrian crossing area. (Vic Roads ruling).

Please note that cars making a U-turn at Perversi Avenue and Hurstbridge Road (opposite the school) **must give way** to all cars including cars turning out of Perversi Avenue.

We are in the fifth year of the implementation of our evidence-based CATCH Maths program. In line with the Victorian Curriculum, as well as incorporating the Department of Education's High Impact Teaching Strategies (HITS), this program incorporates the five key proficiencies that are essential for all maths learners:

- Positive Dispositions
- Understanding
- Fluency
- Reasoning
- Problem Solving

CATCH Maths is an inclusive model which enables all students to succeed. We want all students to get comfortable with being challenged and sitting within 'productive struggle'. This builds confidence, problem solving skills and resilience.

We plan **Challenging Tasks** with a 'low floor' and 'high ceiling'. This means, all students have an entry point into the main task (low floor). It also allows others to go as far as they can with a concept (high ceiling). Teachers use **enabling prompts** to simplify questions when students need support with a task and **extending prompts** when students have demonstrated that they are ready to go further.

A big emphasis is put on **Reasoning**, which is the ability for students to not only recall an answer, but the need to explain their thinking to justify it. Each Friday, students across the school play targeted Maths games that practise the skills for the concept covered that week.

Over the past four years, we have:

- · Supplied all classrooms with a maths trolley full of hands on materials
- Made 50 maths topic tubs for students to use when problem solving
- · Developed a whole school scope and sequence to assist with planning and program development
- Developed our teaching instructional model Launch, Explore, Review
- Developed year level student goals
- Unpacked and refined our application of the High Impact Teaching Strategies (HITS) in Maths

This year we have our Learning Specialist, Matthew Buckley working with staff and students in classrooms five hours a week to assist with all Mathematics teaching and learning.

At Diamond Creek East, we love Maths! CATCH Maths not only teaches students what they need to know, but also what great maths learners DO, and what mindsets are helpful to enable success. The way we talk about Maths matters – we talk about it with excitement, a sense of curiosity and discovery. Our model helps students learn through experience and builds a rich culture of Numeracy within our classrooms.

I wonder what they caught in Maths this week!

School Attendance - Every Day Counts IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS THE PRINCIPAL'S LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Principal will determine if the excuse provided for an absence is reasonable for the purposes of the parent meeting their responsibilities under the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006*. A Principal should use their discretion in making this decision. The Principal or their nominee must record:

Department

of Education

- student attendance twice per day in primary schools and in every class in secondary schools for every student enrolled at the school
- the excuse given for an absence and whether this is reasonable in accordance with the Education and Training Reform Act 2006
- an absence as unexplained if no excuse has been given and change the attendance record once an excuse is provided or established
 - a student is present for a half day when the student has attended at least two hours of instruction.

To meet duty of care responsibilities, the school attendance records should indicate whether the student was physically present in a classroom, or not present but attending a school-approved activity. In the latter situation, the teacher or staff member in charge of the activity should record attendance and ensure parents are notified of any absences in the same manner as for regular absences from school. All students enrolled in the school are required to have their attendance recorded, even if they only attend the school premises part time. Attendance for the times the student is not expected to attend should be recorded so it does not count towards the absences for the school.

The attendance of students at curriculum programs outside school premises will need to be recorded by the provider and reported back and recorded by the school. Schools will manage absences in conjunction with the provider of re-engagement programs or approved education provider.

Rubbish Free Lunches and Nude Food Points are Back in 2024

In an effort to increase our Sustainability practices at DCE we are continuing with our Rubbish Free Lunch and Nude Food House points.

We are encouraging all students to bring a rubbish free lunchbox. This means a lunch that contains no landfill rubbish. Instead, it contains only Nude food and reusable containers. Any student who brings a completely rubbish free lunch will earn points for their House each day.



Students who do have landfill rubbish in their lunchboxes will be asked to *take it home* again. Classroom bins will <u>NOT</u> be available for lunch rubbish and food packaging will not be allowed to be taken out into the yard (canteen rubbish is an exception).

Green Waste Buckets will be in each classroom for the collection of any food waste. These are then taken to a local farm and used in a large Worm Farm, a wonderful off-site addition to our Sustainability Program.

NAPLAN Information for parents and carers 2024

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive) which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, and our series of videos where parents/ carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 13 March 2024 and finishes on Monday 25 March 2024. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.



Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the work of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational fund activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the cost of school trips, camps and sporting activities. This initiative is part of making Victoria the Education State and is the State Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

Applications for the CSEF program will open from the commencement of term one, 2024, helping to ensure that all eligible students are able to participate in school trips and sporting activities.

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card are eligible to apply. A special consideration category also exists.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) Payment Arrangements for 2024 IMPORTANT INFORMATION TO PARENTS

CSEF Application forms will be sent home with the eldest child in the family today - Wednesday 31 January, 2024 or you can collect your form from the General Office if you did not complete a form on or during the 2023 school year.

A payment of \$150.00 for eligible primary school students and \$250.00 for eligible secondary school students will be paid directly to the school to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of the student.

Important Dates:

Monday 29 January, 2024 – CSEF eligibility date. The CSEF web system will perform an automatic check on this date whether a parent's concession card is valid.

Thursday 29 February 2024 - CSEF payments to schools will commence from this date onwards. Regular payment runs will occur throughout terms one and two.


