BEFORE AND AFTER SCHOOL SUPERVISION AND SAFETY

Following on from our last Newsletter-No: 2, I would like to remind parents/ carers that student safety at Diamond Creek East Primary School is our highest priority and the safe and appropriate supervision of students is an important element of our duty of care to students. Part of this duty is ensuring parents and students are aware of our student supervision arrangements before and after school.

Before School: School grounds are supervised from 8.45am to 9.00am every morning. Please note that the oval is not supervised during this time.

After School: School grounds are supervised from 3.30pm to 3.45pm each afternoon. Please note that the oval is not supervised during this time.

Auslan at DCE

What's been happening in Auslan this term?

In <u>Foundation</u>, we've learned that <u>Auslan</u> is short for "<u>Aus</u>tralian <u>Sign Language</u>" and that it is the language of Australian Deaf people. We have watched lots of signed stories and even started to learn signs like "name", "please/thank you", "yes/no", and even some animal signs. We play games that help us to practice making eye contact, use facial expression and use pointing as an important part of visual communication. Currently, we are using "Where is the Green Sheep" to learn some other signs such as "where".

In <u>Discovery</u>, we have learned how to introduce ourselves to others including fingerspelling our names. We are currently investigating signs for emotions that we can put into the sentence "I feel...". We play games that help us to practice asking others how they feel, including using our facial expressions to match the meaning of the signs. "The Color Monster", a picture story book by Alana Llenas, has been our mentor text for this unit. You can watch the YouTube version of it that we've been viewing in class either at this link (https://shorturl.at/grvQ5) or look it up on Youtube by adding "read aloud Joshua Brooks" to the title in the search.

In <u>Challenge</u> and <u>Enrichment</u>, we have been going deeper into greetings and introductions by investigating some of the cultural protocols common to these conversations. These include saying 'hello' or 'good morning', checking and showing understanding, and polite expressions such as "pleased/nice to meet you". We have been viewing some videos about life as a Deaf person in a "hearing" world and discussing what those experiences might be like. The focus will soon shift to building our knowledge of common verbs and nouns that we will use to create sentences. By the end of the year, hopefully we will be starting to develop the ability to have some simple conversations in Auslan only (i.e. no speaking).

If you would like to get a head start on the vocabulary that we will be learning in Challenge and Enrichment, you may be interested to visit the YouTube channel I have recently set up for the sole purpose of helping kids to learn outside the classroom. These videos are being linked to Kahoot quizzes that I make for revision and engagement. All videos are set to "Made for Kids" mode so that all comments are disabled in order to ensure a safe platform that our students can access. The channel is @MrHansford10.

Dear Parents/Carers,

On Wednesday 13 March – Monday 25 March, 2024 students in Grades 3 and 5 will be completing the 2024 NAPLAN tests.

In preparation for NAPLAN all students in Year 3 and 5 will have the opportunity to complete practice tests this term and will need to ensure they have the following items ready.

Students will complete a Writing, Reading, Conventions of Language and Numeracy Test online using the NAP Locked Down Browser App. Please ensure that your child has this App downloaded on their iPad, as requested in the Challenge and Enrichment App list.



NAP Locked Down Browser - Education Services Australia

An app that allows students to securely participate in NAPLAN and NAP Sample tests on the Online National Assessment Platform.

It is essential that all students have working headphones to complete these tests that are clearly named. Parents/Carers will need to provide these to their child/ren.

We have attached a brochure containing some additional information regarding NAPLAN. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact your child/ren classroom teacher.

NAPLAN Information for parents and carers

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with additional information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive) which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the national assessment program.

Adjustments are available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN. Adjustments should reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access NAPLAN, and our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal exemption.



What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests; however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

See the types of questions and tools available in the online NAPLAN assessments at NAP - Public demonstration site.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected for the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency: Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year. If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools
- The community can see information about the performance of schools over time at myschool.edu.au.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame.

The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 13 March 2024 and finishes on Monday 25 March 2024. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.

Enrolling in Foundation (Prep)

Information for parents and carers on when and how to enrol their child in 2025 Foundation (Prep) at a Victorian government primary school.

Steps to enrol your child in Foundation (Prep) for the 2025 school year

To start primary school in 2025, your child will need to turn 5 years old by 30 April 2025. Schooling is compulsory for children who have turned 6 years old.

If your child is starting Foundation (Prep) in 2025, you will be able to apply to enrol your child in a Victorian government primary school from the start of Term 2, 2024 (Monday 15 April 2024).

What you need to do:

- Use <u>Find my School</u> to locate your designated neighbourhood school (referred to as your local school) and other nearby government schools.
- Contact a government primary school to book a school tour or to learn more about the school and the enrolment application process.
- Download the 'Foundation (Prep) Enrolment Information Pack for Parents and Carers.' The pack will be available from Monday 15 April 2024 and will include an application form. The school may also provide you with a copy of the form to complete.
- Submit an enrolment application for Foundation (Prep) by Friday 26 July 2024.
- You will be notified of the outcome of your application between Monday 29 July and Friday 9 August 2024. If you receive an enrolment offer, you should accept the offer by Friday 23 August 2024.
- Take part in enrolment information and transition sessions during Term 4, 2024.
- Your child will start Foundation (Prep) from Wednesday 29 January 2025

Enrolment applications submitted after 26 July 2024 will be processed by the school as they are received, in accordance with the Department of Education's Placement Policy.

Your child has a right to enrol at their local school. Your child's local school is determined on the basis of their permanent residential address. Visit Find my School to locate your child's local school. The enrolling in a school page can also help you to confirm your child's address for enrolment.

If you are seeking to apply to enrol your child in a school that is not their local school, you should read about <u>school zones</u> and how they work and how applications are prioritised using the Department of Education's Placement Policy found on the <u>enrolling in a school</u> page.



Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the work of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational fund activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the cost of school trips, camps and sporting activities. This initiative is part of making Victoria the Education State and is the State Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

Applications for the CSEF program will open from the commencement of term one, 2024, helping to ensure that all eligible students are able to participate in school trips and sporting activities.

Families holding a valid means-tested concession card are eligible to apply. A special consideration category also exists.

CSEF Application forms will be sent home with the eldest child in the family today - Wednesday 31 January, 2024 or you can collect your form from the General Office if you did not complete a form on or during the 2023 school year.

A payment of \$150.00 for eligible primary school students and \$250.00 for eligible secondary school students will be paid directly to the school to be used towards camps, sports and excursion costs for the benefit of the student.

Important Dates:

Monday 29 January, 2024 – CSEF eligibility date. The CSEF web system will perform an automatic check on this date whether a parent's concession card is valid.

Thursday 29 February 2024 - CSEF payments to schools will commence from this date onwards. Regular payment runs will occur throughout terms one and two.
